BREC Tax On Ballot **April 5th**

BATON ROUGE - Voters throughout East Baton Rouge Parish will consider whether to give approval to two property tax renewals for parks and recreation on

Saturday, April 5.

BREC proposes renewing a 4.1-mill tax, which will impose \$150 million in taxes over 10 years and 2.1 mills, which will impose \$77.4 million in taxes over 10 years, for a total of \$227.4 million.

Shelton Mayoral Bid Takes High Ground, Stresses City's Economic Development

CENTRAL - Despite facing an opponent who has launched one personal attack after another, Mayoral candidate Jr. Shelton has taken the high ground and refused to respond in kind.

Instead, Shelton has stayed "on message" and stressed his plans for economic development in Central.

CENTRAL - Mayoral personal attacks, chargcandidate Dave Freneaux is making Central history but not in a way that others may want to duplicate.

Freneaux is a running a negative campaign against fellow Republican Jr. Shelton, making

es, and accusations in virtually every speech, article, and Facebook post. But it doesn't seem to be working.

Central's two prior municipal elections in 2006 and 2010 were positive affairs, generally devoid of personal attacks.

Statewide and national campaigns have become giant mud wrestling contests that leave voters wondering how the two candidates got

out of jail. But negative campaigns are apparently not what Central residents want. Freneaux supporters with access to Freneaux's polls say they show him well behind.

The Central City News spoke about the campaign with more



CITY OF CENTRAL -

Despite strict rules that the questions asked the candidates for Mayor of Central at the March 6 televised debate be kept confidential, may-oral candidate Dave Freneaux not only knew in advance some of the questions that would be asked but actually wrote those questions himself.

The fact that Freneaux wrote some of the questions has been confirmed by four of the six debate organizers and panelists.

The questions written by Freneaux were questions designed to attack the character and fitness of his opponent, Jr. Shelton.

The event, which was held at the Central High Auditorium, was sponsored by the City of Central Chamber of Commerce and the Central Community Alliance. Much of the debate was spent with Shelton defending himself against accusations by Freneaux.

Even though they were aware just before

Freneaux's Negative Campaign Isn't Working

Voters Want to Hear What You Will Do, Not Run Down Other Guy

than a dozen random citizens. Two said they liked Freneaux's approach. "He tells it like it is!" one said.

But others said they disapproved of Freneaux's tactics with a majority strongly disapproving.

Here are the comments we heard:

• "Tell us what your plans are, what you are going to do! We don't want to hear you run down the other guy."

• "Every time I've heard Dave Freneaux speak, all he talks about is the fact that Jr. Shelton took bankruptcy four years ago. So what? Didn't he hear that Louisiana has been through three or four recessions and that hundreds of thousands of people in this state have taken bankruptcy through no fault of their own?"

• "We've all had our problems, but Freneaux seems joyous that a wonderful business went down and a good family lost so much. I can't stand listening to him."

• "Negative, negative, negative. That's all that comes out of his mouth. This is why we have a division in this town. Some people on one side want to spew hateful personal attacks against good people on the other side. But in a way, I'm glad he's doing it. It lets people see the man he really is!"

What he's saying in this campaign is just a continuation of what he's been saying in his newspaper for the past four years. Anyone that disagrees with him is attacked merci-

• "I've tried to stay out of the controversies in Central, but the ugliness he spits out has been an eye-opener for

me. I'm not on the fence anymore."

"This is the politics of personal destruction. It is practiced in every campaign by the Democrats at the national level, and it is despicable. It's just a shame to have this come to our Central.'

• "He apparently doesn't understand the voters. Can't he see that he is destroying any chance he had to be elected by attacking Mr. Shelton?'

By the way, the Central City News has a policy against accepting negative attack ads, and we make candidates

prove any claims made in advertising.

MISUSE OF FACEBOOK. Over the past few years, a lot of people in Central have misused Facebook.. Facebook should be such a positive thing but some people in Central use it to slam each other and create lifelong enemies. Freneaux has been in the middle of that for years.

However, the way he has used Facebook during the campaign has been most unusual. In the past few months,

he has been on Facebook practically full-time, frantically jumping from one Facebook page to another to make posts and argue with his critics. It was not unusual for him to post on five pages



quarrelling and doing battle with anyone who dared to disagree. For quite awhile, he included in virtually every post an attack on Jr. Shelton.

So people who only read his paper have one view of Freneaux's "negative" attack campaign. Those who follow him on Facebook probably

Meanwhile, Jr. Shelton has stayed completely above the fray, saying nothing critical about Freneaux and largely ignoring Freneaux's attacks.

TIME MANAGEMENT. In a campaign, just as in life, a candidate has to decide how to spend his time. While Jr. Shelton has been out walking door to door in every neighborhood in Central, Freneaux has been tearing up Facebook. It will be interesting to see which candidate used his time most widely.

WORDS TO REMEMBER. I seldom read Freneaux's articles, but every once in awhile, someone sends me one they want me to see. Today I received one, and it is must reading, a jewel, a bit of wisdom Freneaux wrote back on March 20, 2010, before Russell Starns launched him in the newspaper business.

Here's what Freneaux posted then:

Often when people use negative politics in an effort to gain support for their candidates, it backfires. The quickest way to lose MY vote is to tell me how bad your opponent is instead of telling me how qualified you are and what a good job you will do if elected."

President to Sign Federal Flood Insurance Legislation

CENTRAL - Councilman Wayne said the Council can now take a lit-Messina said Wednesday the Centle more time to determine what actral City Council made a wise decision to delay spending \$115,000 on a flood insurance study at last week's meeting.

Councilman Aaron Moak, who proposed the spending, said it was urgently needed.

But Councilmen Messina, Tony LoBue, and Ralph Washington voted 3-1 to delay the spending, pending the passage of federal flood insurance legislation.

Mayoral candidate Dave Freneaux blasted the three Councilmen and said it was uncertain whether or when federal flood insurance legislation would pass.

However, that same day the United States Senate passed the bill and sent it to the President's desk. President Obama has announced he will sign the bill.

Since the federal legislation will slash flood insurance rates, Messina

tion needs to be taken on the study.

The Councilman provided a timeline on the flood insurance study proposal:

• March 5, 2014 — U.S. House passed legislation repealing the Biggert Waters Act


• March 11, 2014 — Councilman Moak presented an ordinance to appropriate an additional \$115,000 for flood plain studies. The Council voted to delay the matter for 90 days, in order to await federal legislation.

• March 13, 2014 — Freneaux blasted Messina, LoBue, and Washington, saying it is doubtful the Senate would pass the bill.

• March 13, 2014 — The Senate passed the bill and sent it to President Obama.

• March 15, 2014 — The White House announced the President will sign the legislation.

ahead of or behind the others.

These three types of development have to work together," he said. "If you have retail and not enough people, the retail closes. If you have people but not enough retail, people leave your community because it's not serving their needs. If you have people, but not enough commercial, too many people have to leave your community to work," he said.

Shelton said right now Central has the people but lacks the retail and commercial development that are needed.

"More retail will make life more convenient and enjoyable. However, if new businesses open and we don't support them, Central will get a reputation as a place where you can't

make money and merchants will stay


away from us."
"Commercial development will give our people who are already here access to more, good-paying jobs close to home. So we need to promote commercial development as well.'

Shelton said Central already has enough people to have an outstanding city. Moreover, they are well educated and well trained. "We have expertise in this community in virtually every field of endeavour," he said. Nevertheless, because of Central's

low crime rate and outstanding public and private schools, more people will continue to move here, and the city will have to prepare for that, he said.

Shelton said development needs to be controlled. "One thing I will never do is undermine our rural atmosphere. That is one of our greatest strengths and reasons for existence," he said.

At the top of his list of improvements are a major drainage program and completion of state and local road projects such as Sullivan, Hooper, and Greenwell Springs roads and a new



ment is contracted out and I believe we need to review that contract to add to it services our citizens are now lacking. We can still budget a surplus each year to protect ourselves for future and unknown emergencies.

Q. Would you oppose the commitment of public funds for promoting fairs, festivals, concerts, conventions, or other activities in Central?

A. JR. SHELTON: As a small community operating only on sales taxes, I don't believe we have the luxury of being able to "gamble" on a payoff of giving public funds for private activities, hoping for a bigger return. So my answer is yes, I would oppose it.

Q. What, if any, do you believe is the appropriate role for the City Council in addressing the crime problem?

A. JR. SHELTON: The City Council needs to take the leadership role in providing safety for our citizens.

They should allocate necessary funds upon the request of our Police Department that will help deter any crime within our city, no matter the severity of that crime. The biggest deterrent to crime, I believe, is a strong, outward show of resistance before it becomes an uncontrollable situation.

Q. Do you feel the war on drugs has been effective or ineffective?

A. JR. SHELTON: Most would probably say it has not been effective. My answer is where would we be if there were no "war on drugs"? The problem with this "war" is there's so much money involved that the bad guys refuse to give up. Drugs will destroy society. Q. What would be the single most important way to help small businesses grow and expand in own building. Central?

Our current contractor, IBTS, has restored the public's confidence and provided the services in a professional way. They seem eager to work within the city's oversight.

We have created a positive environment for families or anyone to live with low crime and great public school system. Although the Council is not responsible for our school system in Central it has been very supportive and helped create an economic climate for the school system to prosper. I have worked to make sure that our council takes a strong stand in favor of public access to public records and open meetings. In addition, we have completed a Master Plan that should guide development for years to come.

Q. Why are you offering yourself for service as a City Council member?

said he felt something was not right in the debate because of the "attack" questions and the fact that Freneaux seemed to be reading his answers to certain questions. "Apparently, he wrote the questions himself and then wrote out the answers. I didn't have that advantage. Before the debate, I saw him in the hall practicing reading something he had written," Shelton said. Shelton said he felt an apology was in order from the Central Chamber and the CCA for allowing the de-

bate to go forward.

The confidentiality of the questions was made clear in numerous emails among the debate organizers, including emails sent to Freneaux and Shelton. Under the rules, the questions had to be placed in sealed envelopes and not shown to anyone.

However, in a meeting just before the debate, the breach of protocol was made known to the organizers. Those responsible for questions were Rodney Bonvillain, Angela Summerville,

Ted McCulley, and Lucky Ross. Just before the debate, they met with organizers Ron Erickson of the Chamber and Harry Rauls of CCA. At that time, Rauls asked each of those responsible for the questions if they had shown them to anyone.

The Central City News sent emails to each of the six individuals in the meeting. We asked if Dave Freneaux knew any of the questions in advance or if he wrote any of the questions.

CCA Apologized; Central Chamber Refused

Irregularities in Mayor's Debate

An investigative report by the *Central City News* on the Thursday, March 6 mayoral debate at the Central High auditorium showed that

- Candidate Dave Freneaux had prior knowledge of some of the questions.
- Dave Freneaux actually wrote some of the questions he and Shelton were asked.
- Jr. Shelton had no prior knowledge of the questions.
- The debate organizers, Central Community Alliance and Central Chamber of Commerce, both knew Freneaux had prior knowledge of the questions and that Freneaux had written those questions.
- The debate organizers nevertheless went forward with the debate and allowed the tainted questions to be used.
- The planted questions challenged the character and fitness of Shelton.
- Debate organizers allowed Shelton to walk onto the stage without informing him that Freneaux had prior knowledge of the questions, which allowed Freneaux to write out his answers and prepare his remarks in advance.

Harry Rauls of Central Community Alliance acknowledged the facts above and issued a formal apology to Shelton. While not disputing the facts, Wayne Leader of the Central Chamber said the debate was run properly and did not apologize.

Harry Rauls, president of Central Community Alliance, said:

...the Central Community Alliance and the Central Chamber of Commerce worked diligently together to present a balanced and unbiased Mayoral Debate... Both Candidates, the CCA, and the Chamber understood the importance of protecting the integrity of the questions from being known in advance of the debate by candidate or public. In the meeting to present the sealed questions to the Moderator, it was disclosed that the questions from one candidate, Dave Freneaux, had in fact not only seen his questions, but he had just emailed his questions that afternoon to his panelist... Hindsight is great. The panelists had no way of knowing that Mr. Freneaux would use prepared, well-rehearsed, and negative comments about Mr. Shelton. He did. In hindsight, we could have switched questions, or even called the debate compromised and canceled it. We did not... As President of the CCA, I am totally responsible for our actions in this debate, and I apologize for any action I took to compromise the reputation of CCA. I have personally called and apologized to Mr. Shelton.


Wayne Leader, president of Central Chamber of Commerce, said:

After exhaustive research by myself regarding any improprieties regarding the recent Mayoral Debate hosted in part by the Central Chamber of Commerce and the Central Community Alliance, I stand 100 percent behind the actions of our President Ron Erickson, panelist Lucky Ross, and Rodney Bonvillain, and the process by which the debate was procedurally administered. I consider this issue closed and no further statements will be made.

Ted McCulley, panelist for Jr. Shelton, said:

[Ron Erickson of the Central Chamber] stressed that "Questions are to remain confidential and will be submitted to the moderator." ... The emails sent to Shelton, Freneaux, and Rauls never said the candidates were to formulate the questions... Wayne Leader's statement that he did "exhaustive research" and concluded that there were no improprieties on the part of the Chamber and the CCA.: I beg to differ with him. There were only four panelists. If he had spoken with all of us, he might have gained more insight into the fact that there were improprieties which made the debate weighted toward one candidate. As of this writing neither Wayne Leader nor Central Speaks newspaper has contacted me. Had they done so they might have both avoided stating and printing misconstrued and false statements about the events of the Mayoral debate.



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CPA Board Records Reveal Freneaux Was Neither a CPA nor 'Inactive CPA'

La. R.S. 37:83-84 Provides 1 Year Imprisonment for Using CPA Title Without 'Valid Active Certificate'

CENTRAL - When Dave Freneaux announced his candidacy for Mayor of the City of Central on Aug. 22, 2013, he emphasized that he was a CPA. During his campaign, he referred to himself as a CPA and at other times referred to himself as an "Inactive CPA." He also allowed himself to be called a CPA in public forums and the media without seeking a correction.

But the Louisiana Board for Certified Public Accountants says that he was neither a CPA nor an Inac-

tive CPA.

The use of the term CPA and Inactive CPA are protected by law. CPA is a license issued by the Board. Inactive CPA is also a license issued by the Board. It requires making application and the payment of an annual fee.

Áccording to the Louisiana Board of Certified Public Accountants, Freneaux has not held a CPA license or an Inactive CPA license since Dec. 31, 2006. La. R.S. 37:83 says that in order to use the title CPA, a person must have "a valid active certificate" issued by

the CPA Board.

Criminal Penalties. If anyone violates this section of law, he is subject to a fine of up to \$500 and imprisonment for up to one year or both, for each violation. The misrepresentation of Freneaux's status as a licensed CPA is relevant to the candidate's credibility and compliance with ethical and legal standards.

But it has also been important politically during the current race for Mayor of Central. Freneaux has repeatedly used the term CPA and Inactive CPA in order to bolster his claim to business experience and expertise.

On March 10, 2014, the Louisiana Board of Certified Public Account received an inquiry asking whether Freneaux held a valid active certificate as either a CPA or

an Inactive CPA.

Later that day, he announced that he would no longer refer to himself as a CPA. The board could have issued him a warning advising him to immediately cease and desist using the term CPA or else face disciplinary or criminal action.

In a statement, Freneaux said he had made meticulous efforts to make sure that he did not misrepresent his status as a CPA. However, his statement failed to acknowledge that he had apparently been violating state criminal law by referring to himself as a CPA or Inactive CPA when in fact he was not licensed as either.

If he had wanted to refer to himself as an Inactive CPA, he could have applied to the Board. How**Louisiana Revised Statutes** La. R.S. 37: 83. Unlawful acts

C. No person shall use or assume the title "certified public accountant" or the abbrevia-tion "CPA" or any other title, designation, words, letters, abbreviation, sign, card, or device tending to indicate that such person is a certified public accountant, unless the person hold a valid active certificate issued as provided for in this Part or a privilege pursuant to R.S. 37:94.

R.S. 37:84. Criminal penalties

B. Any person or firm who knowingly violates any provision of R.S. 37:83 shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be subject to a fine of not more than five hundred dollars for each violation or imprisonment for not more than one year, or both.

ever, he did not explain in his statement why he used the designation without seeking Board approval.

Freneaux contacted the Central City News on Wednesday, March 19 and made a statement on his use of the CPA title. He said he has not used the term "CPA" in an attempt to practice or do the work of a currently licensed CPA.

When asked why he used the term CPA in his announcement statement when he was not a licensed CPA, Freneaux said, "Simple lack of careful proofing on my part in the midst of a brand new process for me of running for a public office... The reference was not meant to offer my services as a CPA or to claim to be practicing as a CPA."

At the Mayoral debate on March 6, Freneaux was introduced as a CPA. When asked Wednesday why he did not correct that introduction when he took the podium, since he was not a CPA, Freneaux said, "I did not even pay attention

 CCA president Harry Rauls said, "Rodney Bonvillain told me that, yes, Dave had sent Rodney the questions this afternoon.

 Ms. Summerville and Ted McCulley responded that they heard Bonvillain say that Freneaux was aware of the questions and had in fact written them himself.

Rodney Bonvillain confirmed that

his questions came from Freneaux.
• Ron Erickson of the Chamber responded he would have a statement on the matter the following Monday morning. Chamber chairman Wayne Leader later responded.

• Ross did not respond. In an interview Friday night, Harry Rauls said he feared Freneaux's breach of the rules and the failure of the Central Chamber and CCA to take action before the debate were terrible mistakes that might do irrevocable damage to the reputations of the Chamber and CCA.

Rauls made available to the Central City News all of the emails among the organizers (Harry Rauls and Ron Erickson), the candidates (Jr. Shelton and Dave Freneaux), the panelists (Angela Summerville, Rodney Bonvillain, Ted McCulley, and Lucky Ross), and the moderator (Phil Rainier).

The emails were almost all directed to the candidates. Some of the other participants were left "out of the loop." The emails to the candidates stressed confidentiality of the questions.

Security about the questions was supposedly very tight.

Even Phil Rainier, the moderator, was denied the opportunity to attend the question meeting Sunday night before the debate out of fear the questions might be leaked.

Only two persons could benefit from leaked questions — Jr. Shelton and Dave Freneaux.

For a total of eight questions. Questions are to remain confidential and will be submitted to the moderator.

Here is the exchange of emails between CCA president Harry Rauls and moderator Phil Rainier:

 HARRY RAULS to PHIL RAIN-IER: "Sorry I cannot invite you to meet with question selection meeting Sunday. Call me if any questions."

• PHIL RAINIER: "Harry, I just

saw the note about not being able to invite me to be at the planning meeting. So, you do not need me out there today? What is the reason?'

• HARRY RAULS: "Phil, mostly, Chamber is afraid of leaked ques-tions beforehand. I have also recused myself, Messina, and Fralick also, so we canceled meeting on Sunday. Angela Summerville and David Barrow will come up with CCA's 2 questions and present them to you with the other 6 at 30 minutes before Debate.

If you have any questions or suggestions, please call me or Ron Erickson.

See you on Thursday. Thanks"
In an atmosphere of such security over the questions, it seems disingenuous to suggest that a candidate could write the questions that would be asked his opponent.

In an interview the Monday after the debate, one of the panelists, Rodney Bonvillain, who had been named a panelist by Freneaux, said he was unaware that Freneaux was not supposed to know the questions. He said, "I wasn't trying to hide anything. I freely admitted that I got questions from Freneaux. It was an innocent

misunderstanding. I had no intent to violate any rule.'

The review of emails showed Bonvillain was not included in the same email chain as candidates Dave Freneaux and Jr. Shelton. As a result, while Freneaux was repeatedly told the questions were confidential, Bonvillain was not.

In the days after the debate, Harry Rauls issued an apology to Shelton on

behalf of himself and CCA. However, Central Chamber chairman Wayne Leader issued a statement saying the debate was conducted properly and that he would have no further comment.


bate, the Advocate ran a major story about the debate on Page B-1. The story focused on Freneaux's attacks on Shelton. The lead paragraph of the story identified Freneaux as a CPA. When asked whether he had asked the Advocate for a retraction or correction, Freneaux told the Central City News that he had not. "I do not recall seeing the reference. So I could not have asked for a correc-

When asked why he has sometimes referred to himself as an Inactive CPA, which is a category of license issued by the CPA Board when he was not in fact an Inactive CPA, Freneaux said, "I have never introduced myself as "CPA Inactive" and have never printed that on any campaign literature. I believe the only reference was a facebook comment..."

However, in the Jan. 9, 2014 issue of *Central Speaks*, Freneaux referred to himself as a "CPA Inactive."

Freneaux says that six days ago he applied to the CPA Board and was granted a CPA Inactive license.

Earlier in the campaign, Freneaux, a Republican, refused to answer a standard questionnaire from the Republican Party of East Baton Rouge, seeking information on his background and his position on issues. The party routinely verifies claims by Republican candidates on their residency, college degrees, military service, and licenses, in order to insure that Republican candidates are representing themselves honestly to the voters.


