Mayor-Elect Reaches Out To Bring City Back Together

CENTRAL - Nearly 40 percent of Central's voters went to the polls April 5 and gave a resounding, landslide vic-tory to local realtor Jr. Shelton, who was elected Mayor.

The voters swept into office five of his politi-cal allies — new Police Chief James Salsbury, and Council memberselect Dr. Kim Fralick, Shane Evans, and John Vance, and incumbent Council member Wayne Messina.

Shelton received 59 percent of the vote to Dave Freneaux's 41 percent. All of the candidates in the election were Republicans.

Meanwhile, another ally of Shelton, Central Councilman and Mayor Pro-Tem Ralph Washington ran fifth in the Council race and will face a runoff May 3 against the sixth place candidate, Jason Ellis. Four incumbent city





## **Country Living in the City Ralph Washington: A Man Who Stands Tall for Central**

When Central Was On the Ropes, Ralph Washington Saved the Day



In the nine-year history of the City of Central, there is one man who stands out. A man who was part of the City from the beginning and who has been unwavering in his loyalty, integrity, and commitment to the people of Central.

That man is Ralph Washington. For nine years, he has served as a member of the City Council and as Mayor Pro-Tem. Never once has there been a conflict of interest or a hint of impropriety or dishonesty.

He has stood forthrightly, uncompromisingly for what is right, no matter what the cost to him.

Example No. 1 - The bill to create the Central Community School Sys-

A tall black man rose to his feet and walked to the witness chair. He wasn't supposed to speak. No one told him to speak. He got up on his own. He said. "Don't tell me about discrimination. I've been fighting it all my life. That's not the Central I know. I'm the Mayor Pro-Tem of Central, and this is about education for all our children!

Then he sat down, and everything had changed. The bill passed out of committee and then the floor!

One man stood up and spoke the truth. And they KNEW it was the truth because HE said it.

Many people have played a vital role in creating the Central school system, but if had not been for one man — Ralph Washington — I'm not sure it would have ever made its way through the legislature.

Example No. 2 - At about the same tem was being debated in a legislative time, Central was under attack in the

court of public opinion. The presi-dent of the NAACP in Baton Rouge, tion. They became secretive and re-Kwame Asante, came out to Central and went on TV the next day. He told WAFB-TV he had felt threatened in Central, being a black man at night. It was a racist place.

The propaganda against Central on TV was unrelenting. Not a white person in Central could stand up and say We're not racist! It would have had no credibility.

But there was one man who could. Ralph Washington. And he did.

He got on Channel 9 and said, "I've

lived in Central for years, and I've never seen anything like that in Central. The blacks and whites get along just fine in Central." Suddenly, it was over! Once again, Ralph

Washington spoke truth and ended a crisis.

Example No. 3 - CH2MHill was making Central into a company town

fused to comply with the Louisiana's Public Records Law.

But Ralph Washington spoke up on the Council and demanded that they comply with the law. At his urging, the Council ordered them to produce the records. He wouldn't sit silently and let the people of Central have their right to access to public records taken away.

Example No. 4 — When CH2M-Hill defied the City Council and continued to violate the public records law and refused to produce the public records, Ralph Washington led the fight to take away their contract and put it out to public bid. Once again, he was successful. Right prevailed, and Central got a new city contractor.

Over the past nine years, there have been many other times Ralph Washington has saved the day for this community.

His ad says he's stood up for Cen-tral, and it's true! He has! Now he faces a tough reelection campaign May 3. If ever there were a public servant who deserved to be reelected, it is our own Mayor Pro-Tem, Ralph Washington.

Incumbent City Council member Aaron Moak sought reelection but was defeated.


Watts, Browning, and DeJohn have served in city government since Central was incorporated in July 2005. All were appointed by then Gov. Kathleen Blanco and later won election. Moak is completing his second term on the Council, and

LoBue is completing his first term. The Mayor's race between Shelton and Freneaux was heated, as Freneaux repeatedly attacked Shelsponded to the attacks nor made any of his own. That seemed to serve him well with voters, who tired of the negative attacks.

As of now, only one incumbent elected official is returning to city government, Councilman Wayne Messina. If Washington wins the May 3 runoff, he would be the only other veteran member of the Council. Washington would also be the only one of Central's original Founding city officials to still hold public office nine years later.

Washington said there is so much to learn as a new Council member and that experience is important.

"I've been part of the city from the beginning and have attended the committee meetings, the Council meetings, and all of the events that you have to attend. It has provided me with a wealth of knowledge that a new Councilman won't have for quite some time," he said.

Washington has been a student

of the city budget and has been instrumental in monitoring the activities of the city contractor. He was the only critic of CH2MHill on the Council from 2008 to 2010 and he led the fight to oust the firm and place the city's privatization contract out to public bid.

The City of Central has an annual

budget of \$6.5 million and runs a healthy surplus. It has cash on hand of roughly \$20 million, an unusual situation for a city government its size in these economic times, when many cities are fighting off bankruptcy. The top vote-getter in the Council race was Dr. Kim Fralick, who knocked on more than 5,500 doors. That hard work paid off, as she received 5,135 votes, or 69.9 percent. She led the field of 11 candidates.

The top candidate for City Council in Central's first citywide election in 2006 was Ralph Washington, which led to his being elected Mayor Pro-Tem by the Council.

In 2010, the top vote-getter for the Council was Dr. Tony LoBue. However, when asked if he would stand for Mayor Pro-Tem, he declined and said he preferred to support Ralph Washington for another term in that position.

All of the victors in this election were endorsed by the Republican Party of East Baton Rouge, as was Washington.

They will be sworn in July 1.





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






Shelton said he had a good meeting with Central Mayor Mac Watts,



He said Central is a good place to start a business or buy a home. As far as development, he said it is





that its decisions would be recommendations only and that he would reserve the right to make the final decisions himself.

He said the group will help him prioritize the major issues facing the

city and help him plan the first 120 days of his administration.

He said he hopes action items will be prioritized and included in a legislative package he will submit to the new City Council.

Shelton said the committee held

an organizational meeting Monday night. "A lot of attention was given to working together and putting Central First," he said.

"The next meeting will produce more detailed actions. Everyone agreed that this effort will help us produce a good start for the city," he said.

Because the meetings are advisory in nature to a person who has not yet taken office, they are not covered by Louisiana's Public Meetings Law.

However, the mayor-elect said the

transition team will hold two Town Hall meetings to get input directly from citizens in June. The exact times, dates, and locations will be announced later, he said.

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

# Jason Ellis: What Central Means to Me

**CENTRAL** - In the 1850's my 4th great grandfather, Maglorie "Mac" Bourke, brought his family of 10 to live here in Central. Mac was a carpenter born in West Baton Rouge and the son of Acadian immigrant Joseph F. Bourke or Bourg.

He helped his neighbor Daniel Boone Morgan build the old Morgan house which was located at the corner of Morgan Road and Thibodeaux Road. In later years, the Thibodeaux family married into the Bourke family, and other Acadian families moved to the area known as Frenchtown Road.

In the early days before there was a Catholic church in Central, the Acadian families of the area would pick up a priest by horse and buggy at St. George in Baton Rouge and ride him out to the Frenchtown Road

area to say mass for the local people.

The priest would visit after mass and spend the night at the Bourke family home. In 1898, St. Francis of Assisi, a Catholic Missionary Church was constructed by local residents. It later to be known as St. Alphonsus Catholic Church.

My 3rd great grandfather, Alphonse Bourke, and my 2nd great grandfather, Eddie Thibodeaux, transported by wagon yellow pine from Greensburg to Central and helped construct the single-story wooden structure.

Eddie's half-brother Tolbert Richard, who lived at the corner of Greenwell Springs Road and Frenchtown Road, donated the land where the church stands today.

Before there were automobiles, the children of the Frenchtown Road area would travel to the new Central public school at Hooper Road and Sullivan Road by wagon and mule. These were known as Hacks. My great grandmother, Lillian Thibodeux Valega, drove one of the Thibodeaux hacks to the Central school in the early 1900's.

When automobiles were invented, roads were improved and named. The winding roads in this area cut through the property of these Acadian families. In this area of Central, many roads still bear the name of these early Acadian settlers such as Frenchtown, Thibodeaux, and Planchet Roads.

Planchet is a Cajun-French word that sometimes meant wood or woodworker.

Many thanks to my grandmother, Mildred Valega Strickland, for sharing with me our family history.

Central is about families, not government or politics. At some point in time, someone from each of your families thought Central was a great place to raise a family and that's why you live here today.

Today Central is still a place where neighbors look out for one another. We are all blessed to have great schools and a safe place to rest our heads at night.

My sons are the 8th generation of our family to call Central home and I wouldn't have it any other way.

On May 3rd, the people of Central will elect Mr. Washington or myself for the fifth and final council seat of this great city.

Win or lose, I am thankful to have gotten to meet so many people of this city. Please help our cities newly-elected leadership keep Central's promise of good family living for our future generations. Family, that is what Central means to me. God Bless.
